A Note from Tom

In July, I travelled to Baltimore to participate in the Episcopal Church's General

Convention. It was a great experience for me as I became aware of the Episcopal Church as a national entity, shaping policies and procedures that guide not only our lives as Episcopalians, but our American society altogether. Needless to say, it was an eye-opening experience for me, and I am thankful for the opportunity.

But the Episcopal Church is also part of an *international* entity, which is the Anglican Communion.

Based in 165 countries and representing some 85 million Christians – the Anglican Communion is one of the world's largest Christian denominations.

With such scale and reach, the Anglican Communion can have a significant influence in responding to world issues.

One of the ways in which the churches of the Anglican Communion unite is through an international conference of bishops called the **Lambeth Conference**. It is held every ten years and was first convened in 1867. Lambeth is the name of the London residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

This year, our Episcopal Bishops are troubled by the fact that the Lambeth Conference invited spouses of bishops, but then *uninvited* the spouses of LGBTQ+ bishops. In addition to being blatantly discriminatory, this action by the Lambeth Conference is just plain rude.

Furthermore, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, intends to ask bishops to vote on provisions that call on the bishops to reaffirm the 1998 Lambeth gathering's stance *against* same-sex marriage by stating that "it is the mind of the Anglican Communion as a whole that same-gender marriage is not permissible."

This stance, of course, runs contrary to the position of the Episcopal Church, as well as the churches of Canada, New Zealand, Scotland and Wales, who likewise favor marriage equality.

Why favor marriage equality? In my mind, the answer is simple; because denying LGBTQ+ individuals the right to marriage is a blatant act of discrimination. It is no different than the antimiscegenation laws that prevented marriage between people of perceived differing races. Antimiscegenation laws were enforced in certain U.S. states until 1967, in Nazi Germany (the Nuremberg Laws), and in South Africa during the Apartheid era.

I pray deeply for the bishops from around the world who are gathering to consider this question. I pray that they can open their hearts to our LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters and put an end to discrimination based on sexual identity.

I close now with the words of our presiding bishop, Bishop Michael Curry: "We have worked hard to become a church where, as the old African slaves used to sing, 'There is plenty good room, plenty good room,' for all of God's children. We are all The Episcopal Church, and we will not compromise who we are, our connections, or our love."






2^{nnd} Annual Sunshine Service Scheduled for August 21st!

June income was down considerably from earlier this year. Total Income was actually down by \$1,568.55 from budget. This, unfortunately, continues the downward trend of the last two years. One could say that it is summer and parishioners are away. However, income is still ahead of YTD budget by \$3,115.86. This downward trend needs to be closely watched as the current performance over budget can be erased in just a few months if income does not increase. Also, this summer trend could be reduced or eliminated if more parishioners would sign up to use Tithe.ly automatic monthly payment system. This allows continued monthly or weekly payments even if you are on holiday. Expenses continue to be well controlled with June's Total Expense being \$1,573.98 below budget. YTD expenses also continue to be below budget by \$1,331.37. This is good expense control.

Actual YTD income vs. Budget is \$4,447.23. This is more due to expense control than income, but it does give a cushion against the current trend of reduced monthly income.



Corinne & Jim have Kittens!




