

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### Pastor's Corner

Dear people of St. John's,

Pentecost has evaporated at long last, and our anticipation of Advent has arrived. In the four weeks of Advent, we are attentive to time, since there never appears to be enough of it this time of year. Hours and days appear to run together as we await the birth of our Christ Child, as well as His second coming.

Our Scripture readings focus on the end times, John the Baptist heralding the coming of Jesus' ministry, and the birth our Lord and Savior. Sometimes in the solitude of the season, our fears and concerns, our hopes for the future, and our visions rise to the surface. We face ourselves and the Journey which lies ahead and at the same time realize we can find companionship for the road ahead through Jesus.

Our readings expand and challenge the welcoming of the baby Jesus. We have God coming as a judge and calling us into a life of justice which can invoke both anticipation and fear as we choose the meaning of what is right or wrong.

Often in the Bible, God meets humans on a mountain. In our language a

mountaintop experience is one which is so overwhelming that it can change one's future. All of these experiences can be superimposed in our church. The Chris-



tian mountain is wherever we receive the word and sacraments.

In this season of preparation and expectation let us find active ways to express our faith, through areas of personal development, family development, and church community development. These acts of faith will allow us to put on the armor of God.

We are offered a glimpse of God's vision for creation and humanity. We are challenged to set life's goals around this vision. Advent invites the church to dream of what God's will is being done fully, "on earth as in heaven."

### Remember St. John's in your will:

#### Year-End Strategies for Reducing Income Taxes

For those of us who must withdraw a certain amount from our IRA's every year (commonly known as RMD or Required Minimum Withdrawal), there is a way to reduce the taxes due on that withdrawal. If you designate a non-profit organization (like St. John's) as the recipient of the withdrawal AND if the check from the fund is written directly to the organization, it will NOT be taxable. You can use this approach for a year-end

donation OR you can do it to fund your annual pledge for 2024. Either way, your savings helps an organization and you get a tax break! A win/win, right? Talk to your investment firm about their process for making this happen. It won't be difficult.

Harold and Jason spoke extensively about Al's life, his family and the fond memories that they would cherish. Harold had just begun to serve at St. John's but that didn't matter — he connected with the family and crafted a service that would inspire and comfort friends and family. And Michelle and Jason bravely fought off tears as they offered touching tributes to their father.



One of his caregivers from American House drove from the west side of the state for the viewing and service. She told me that Al shared his infectious humor with everyone right to the end. He ran a good race and crossed the finish line in style.

We keep Michelle, Scott, Jason and Linda in our prayers. It's always hard to lose someone you love but especially during this time of year. May the Holy Spirit bring them comfort and peace.



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### A New Assisting Bishop for Eastern & Western Michigan Dioceses Announced

The Diocese of Eastern Michigan shared some exciting and hope-filled news: the Rt. Rev. Skip Gladstone Adams will formally return to our body as Assisting Bishop, expected to serve from now until the calling of a new bishop provisional or bishop diocesan. Many will remember Bishop Skip's compassionate, playful, and prayerful ministry amongst us as Assisting Bishop in 2021.

"Assisting Bishops" are already-consecrated bishops (meaning, they've served in another diocese before) and are called to serve in a specific role as determined by the ecclesiastical authority. The areas that our Joint Standing Committees have specifically asked Bishop Skip to attend to include:

Pastoral care and support to clergy, leadership, and laity of the dioceses, specifically attentive to our reality of having two recent situations of bishop discipline

Support, wisdom, and advice to diocesan leadership

Represent the dioceses in the House of Bishops and in councils of the wider Episcopal Church Preside over diocesan liturgies: confirmations, ordinations, celebrations of new ministry

Consultation and support for diocesan staff

Assistance with elements of clergy transitions and discernment processes: bishop-to-bishop calls, consent to Letters of Agreement, letters dimissory, selection of postulants and candidates for ordination, supervision of deacons (in consultation with archdeacons and staffs), clergy licensing, disciplinary matters

His service with us is part-time, about 12-15 hours per week. He will be primarily remote, serving with us from his home in New York state while traveling in occasionally for some in-person gatherings. The costs related to this position are shared equally between the dioceses.

Several of us from St. John's attended a seminar where Bishop Skip was one of the speakers. He was humble, insightful and fun. If he leads another seminar in his time with us, we should ALL make an effort to attend. It was THAT good.
